NEW YORK—Jansher Khan of Pakistan and Australian Chris Dittmar set up a rematch of last September's fight for the world crown on Thursday when they advanced to the final of the \$50,000 U.S. Open Squash Championships.

The third-seeded Pakistani, who defeated Dittmar at the World Open in Birmingham, England, upset his top seeded compatriot Jahangir Khan 17-16 8-15 4-15 15-10 15-4 to advance.

The fourth-seeded Dittmar, who won last week's Canadian Open in Toronto, eliminated second-seeded Ross Norman of New Zealand 15-11 15-7 15-3 in their semi-final

The 18-year-old Jansher is ranked fourth by the International Squash Players

Association (Ispa), while Dittmar, 23, is ranked fifth.

Jansher defeated the top-ranked Jahangir for the fourth consecutive time on Thursday.
